What is Old School Intergenerational Projects?

Who are the performers?

Claire and Erin are the co-founders of Old School. They are professionally trained actor, singer, dancers and have many years of experience working with and performing for folks of all ages.

How is this show created specifically for people living with dementia?

Language and plot are kept to a minimum so that audience members may enjoy the music, moments, and sensory opportunities within the show without feeling like they are missing anything. Images in the show are extended to allow for comprehension or appreciation and the seasons in which the scenes take place are clearly delineated by our window and costume layers.

Can carers/loved ones attend this performance with residents?

Yes! We encourage loved ones to come. This is meant to be an experience for all people to enjoy and is a great opportunity for connection.

What benefit does the show have for people living with dementia?

This show offers participatory opportunities that most traditional theatre experiences do not. This allows the audience to feel like they are a part of the action. For people who are living with dementia an opportunity to help and/or participate can improve their confidence and sense of agency. The action portrayed of living the by sea may not necessarily stimulate specific memories, but it could incite a feeling of familiarly or comfort.

Through visual, audible, olfactory, and tactile prompts some people living with dementia may gain a moment of clarity, or experience something as simple as a moment of heightened engagement.

What can the show offer carers of people who are living with dementia?

People living with dementia may not be able to communicate in the same way they did before, but this show (and the arts in general) can be used as a creative gateway to find new ways to communicate with loved ones. Carer's often experience stress and

pressure caring for their loved ones living with dementia. This show is an opportunity for them to experience, participate, play, and laugh together. There are no expectations of needing to understand or follow along; it is a great way to simply be in the moment, together.

How many people can attend?

As many as your space allows for. We ask that audience members are seated in a semi-circle. If two rows are needed, please leave space for performers to walk in front and behind both rows.

What happens if an audience member wanders onstage during the show, or begins to shout?

If an audience member joins performers onstage, we ask that a staff or family member shadow the participant in case they become a hazard to themselves or others. Performers are well versed in including unexpected surprises though and will ask staff/family to assist or re-seat the individual only if necessary.

If an audience member makes sound during the performance, we ask that they not be removed unless it appears they are in some kind of distress. At that point a break from the space may be recommended in case the audience member is feeling overstimulated.

Does the show involve the sense of taste?

Old School is not able to provide any food during the performance. Please keep an eye on those in your care if you think they may interpret a sensory object as something edible.

What measures are in place to prevent the spread of Covid 19?

Old School is happy to accommodate any venue mandated measures to prevent the spread of Covid-19. That said, performers are not masked during the show as facial expression and vocalizing is required of them. Performers will wear masks during sensory exploration near audience members, and at all other times in the venue. All props used through the show will be sanitized after each performance.

How can we best prepare residents for the performance?

Old School is happy to provide posters to allow residents and loved ones to be made aware of the upcoming event, and pre-performance programs can be requested in advance which outlines what to expect during the show itself.

How long is the show?

The show is approximately 45 minutes long.
